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# A Need and a Vision Leads to a Longtime Ministry FCC Claremore Feeds & Nourishes Through Food & Love

At First Christian Church in Claremore, Oklahoma, (FCC Claremore), they truly nourish and literally feed their community each week. As soon as one steps inside the church's Family Life Center on Monday evenings for "Friendship Feast" there are welcoming hugs, handshakes and smiles. Compassion and sheer joy can be found on all the faces of the guests and volunteers.

Friendship Feast is the brainchild of Russ Riffle, FCC Claremore elder and head chef at a individuals in need, this ministry is seeking additional funding. An empty coffee container is available for those who can and wish to give a love offering for the meal, but the weekly collections provide less than half of what is necessary to continue the ministry.

The saying, "It takes a village," rings true in Claremore as FCC Claremore and nearby Redeemer Lutheran Church coordinate to prepare and serve a meal each week.

As the economic recession deepened, more and more neighbors came to the church asking for help, and Friendship Feast was launched.

For nearly seven years this community outreach ministry has been self-sustaining every Monday evening, come rain, shine or holiday; however, due to the greater number of

There are also two groups that meet at Initially, a trial fund-raising meal was held for the church on Mondays following each meal and they assist with breaking down tables and chairs.

> The meal is served to all who are hungry in the community and beyond.

Depending on the particular Monday, a small team of church volunteers can serve upwards of 100 or more people. Guests include: young families on limited incomes, elderly on fixed incomes,



transition housing residents, domestic abuse shelter residents, single parents with young children and occasionally local college students.

One might

expect this meal to be a quiet and somber event; however, it is quite the opposite. It's a joyous gathering of community and neighbors who share and receive blessings from everyone present.

Food is served buffet style on dishes. From the beginning, the church has used its best dishes as a way of showing honor to all diners while conserving resources.

Guests sit around tables adorned with festive centerpieces and eat with real silverware. Hot coffee, tea and ice water are served by a lovely retired woman who devotes each Monday evening to serving.

Church volunteers gather in the kitchen for prayer before serving the meal. They feed and nurture through kindness and action.

The feast offers refuge for the tired and hungry as well as fellowship for those seeking something outside of traditional church. Prayer request forms are available on each table for guests to fill out and return to the pastor for sharing on Sunday morning.

Recently ODF awarded grant funds to assist with Friendship Feast.

## **ODF Awards More Than \$50,000 Through Its New Grant Program**

ODF is pleased to announce that \$50,648.90 in grant fund monies were delivered to Disciples churches or non-profit organizations to support various missions and ministries within Oklahoma and beyond. The Grant Committee, composed of volunteer ODF board members and former board members, was faced with the responsibility of allocating the funds among grant requests totaling more than \$370,000. Of the 44 requests for funds, 14 requests were awarded full or partial funding.

The grant process had some hiccups and the ODF staff is diligently working to create a more streamlined and transparent grant application process for next year with plans on an earlier determination of grant fund allocation by the end of March 2018. Details will be available on our website following board approval in late October. Previous applicants will be notified of the new procedure via email early next year.

In this newsletter and future newsletters as well as on our website, we will be sharing stories from the recipients of grant funds as well as the very deserving ministries and missions of those who did not receive funding. Our goal is to share the needs of the community so that others may feel called to help.
